## Habitat Brisbane Day

Forty Habitat Brisbane bushcare groups recently held working bees and activities across the city as part of a highly publicised and coordinated project planned to attract new volunteers and to inform the community.

Conducted between 9 am and 11 am on Sunday, 18 May, there was a mix of revegetation tasks, displays, presentations concerning various types of local wildlife and the usual brews, biscuits and cake at the end.

Along Kedron Brook, the Zion Hill, Melrose Park, Benelong

Park, Lutwyche Reach Revegetation Project, Grinstead Park and Ferny Grove bushcare groups participated.

Zion Hill group started with a Geckoes Wildlife Presentation wildlife display, and

## **Infrastructure Projects**

The Gateway Duplication project proceeds apace, with works soon to commence over Kedron Brook. State Government has agreed with the contractor that the two "future" lanes on this section be built with the initial works, so we will see six lanes not four over the waterway. The temporary barge bridge has already been moved in anticipation of the engineering work, and temporary "causeways" will be built out into the channel to assist construction. All of these works are to be made good on completion. As part of the conditions of their contract, the contractor will also be rehabilitating some 5 ha of the Minippi Wetlands, near their southern works.

The winning Airport Link and Northern Busway tender was recently approved, and you are all encouraged to have a look at some of the changes the successful consortium is proposing. There will be more use of the tunnel borers and some "burying" of the ventilation stations. However the construction yard at Toombul will have to be bigger to

continued with weed removal from established plantings. Consistent work over the years at this site has produced excellent results.

Melrose Creek Park Leader John Lister acknowledged the energetic efforts of 22 participants, including 14 people who had never been there before! Weeding and mulching was carried out along the Creek and a well-established plot nearer the bowling club. All enjoyed the final break at morning tea.

#### **Planting at Arbor Street**

#### **Padua College Excursion**

Year 11 students from Padua College have recently been out and about along the Brook on a school excursion, monitoring the impact different land uses are having on our catchment, and identifying weeds.

Catchment Coordinator, Lesley Collins, met with the class on Friday 30 May in the pouring rain at their semi-rural site in Upper Kedron, where they talked about weeds. The site contained a number of grasses including pigeon, para, signal and roves, with wide spreading lantana camara and clusters of Easter Cassia.

The students then proceeded to Grovely Sports grounds where they assessed the impacts of recreational uses. They then were off to the Grange to assess residential impacts on the environment.

## More about Habitat Brisbane Day

Benelong Park concentrated upon activities in which the whole family could participate. Children were involved in all aspects of the revegetation area selected to strengthen the banks of a small watercourse. In between, parents assisted the children to complete their colouring-in entries for the competitions set up for all participating groups on this special day.

A number of Steve Parish's stunning publications on wildlife were used as prizes in two competitions,

one for participants at each local event and the other for colouring-in pictures completed by children in advance (or on that day) on prepared forms.

At Lutwyche, the group was appreciative of the help from Conservation Volunteers Australia with the tree planting, mulching and watering of new plants on a rather steep bank. This completed the development of a long section of well established

native plants.

Grinstead Park planted along their frog project creek (weeding for anyone who preferred to do so!), conducted a frog display and talked about the frogs found in the park. They conducted a butterfly walk, and gave away butterfly-host plants to participants. If that wasn't enough, people were spoilt with morning tea and home-baked cooking.

The group at Ferny Grove completed their revegetation of a garden plot adjoining the

State High School grounds. Set under stately tall eucalypts, it looked a treat!

Habitat Brisbane Day was certainly successful in our catchment. Activities were planned in advance by our group leaders to consider the needs of volunteers and ensured that adequate success rewarded effort.

The smaller groups benefited greatly from the media promotion by BCC with the added interest generated by the competitions. The inclusion of appropriate activities attracted volunteers as well as young children and was vital to the overall success. (CI)

## **Birds Survey**

So far this year, surveys of bird species have been carried out at Kalinga Park to Toombul, Cedar Creek in Upper Kedron, and along Lanita Street to the entrance to Maureen Lawrence Park from Ferny Grove.

A recent environmental walk led by Greg Miller on May 18, found 39 bird species together with a number of other environmental interests at Kalinga Park and Wavell Heights Cressey St Wetlands.

Now, a further series of surveys are being planned on the mornings of particular Sundays and Mondays through the next few months.

## Learn that Weed!



Stinking passion flower (Passiflora foetida)

Another climber with stems up to 4 m long, with sparse to dense white to yellowish hairs, odd smell. Leaves often with 3-5 pointed lobes, 3-5 cm across.

Flowers are of typical passionfruit type,

pinkish or whitish. Fruits are 1.5 -3 cm dia., surrounded by odd-looking spiky bracts (as per insert right).



Ranked number 70 in the Qld Herbarium Invasive Naturalised Plants in Southeast Qld. Ranked List though not on BCC's list of environmental weeds. Corky passion vine (Passiflora suberosa), is number 37 in the ranked list, is on BCC's list of weeds, but has 3 pointed, ivy-like leaves and white corkybarked lower stems. (CI)

You may have noticed press coverage on the Northern Link Tunnel (Kelvin Grove to Toowong), which is likely to form a key part of any such strategies.

The team tell us they are looking at an overall solution, to include all means of transport, interestingly relying upon rail (at this stage) as the key mass people mover. It seems a reorganisation of frequency can carry many more commuters on the same lines, before new ones need to be built. It is also likely that the Trouts Road corridor will be developed as one of the key links to the north.
