## Grant for weed control on Sparkes Hill.

Kedron Brook Catchment Branch has made application through the Brisbane City Council's Community Conservation Partnerships Program for a grant to undertake weed control on areas of Sparkes Hill at Everton Park. The grant will help cover the cost of weed removal in several areas of the bushland in the park that are becoming infested. The park is well used – including KBCB which does bird surveys there several times a year. We'll let you know if we are successful.
