General comments: A delightful birding with the equal highest number of species ever observed on one of our walks (cf. 50 species observed on Toombul-Nundah Lake walk, October 2008). This large number surprised our group because the downcast sky made identification harder than normal due to relatively poor colour perception. Despite a gloomy forecast, no rain fell during this walk. A bird rather like a Shining Bronze-Cuckoo was observed but not definitively identified.
